CURRICULUM NEWS

At Sebert Wood we are always developing and improving our curriculum and Maths has been a key focus for us during the last year. Following on from his recent Maths Hub training Mr Tottie is developing the teaching and learning of Maths through a 'mastery' approach. He is working with staff and pupils on key mathematical concepts. Inspired by teaching approaches from Singapore and Shanghai, 'mastery' is an inclusive way of teaching, grounded in the belief that ALL pupils can achieve in Maths.

A concept is deemed 'mastered' when pupils can represent it in multiple ways, can communicate solutions using mathematical language and can independently apply the concept to new problems. As a school we are investing in new resources to allow our pupils to do this and FOSWS have kindly purchased some Numicon, a highly regarded multi-sensory resource for pupils. We want all pupils to be able to see Maths as an interconnected subject to develop fluency, reasoning and competence in solving sophisticated problems. We also want pupils to apply their mathematical knowledge to other subjects.



The expectation in the National Curriculum is that the majority of pupils will move through the programmes of study at broadly the same pace. However, decisions about when to progress should always be based on the pupil's understanding and their readiness to progress to the next stage. Pupils who grasp concepts rapidly should be challenged through difficult problems, before any acceleration through new content. Those who are not sufficiently fluent with earlier material consolidate understanding, including additional practice, often the same day, before moving on. The old National Curriculum measured progress in terms of levels, and pupils were often moved onto more complex concepts before really mastering earlier ones. The current curriculum encourages a study of fewer skills in greater depth. Teachers from Y1 to Y6 are using schemes of learning, published by White Rose to plan effective maths lessons in reasoning, fluency and problem solving. Lessons are differentiated through variation and challenge. Teaching methods in the classroom today are often quite different from how many adults were taught. There is now much greater emphasis on helping pupils understand "why" rather than just telling them "how". In this way the pupils will be much better placed to apply their understanding in real situations. Improved reasoning allows pupils to explain their understanding of a Maths concept. By ensuring all pupils can verbalise thinking, it helps build a secure understanding of a concept rather than having a superficial understanding that may later turn into a misconception. Many of the formal methods that parents remember from their school days will still be taught, but only at a stage when pupils are able to understand not just what to do but why they are doing it. The pupils will then have a useful bank of methods to draw on and are able to choose the one that works for them when applying knowledge. Watch out for our calculation method videos which will soon be available on the 'Learning Links' section of our school website. In the meantime we asked some Key Stage 2 children for their thoughts about maths.

Other Essential Day to Day Information

- LOST PROPERTY—We have a growing pile of lost property! We return labeled items to their owners but we still have lots of unnamed sweat tops and other items in the box. Please help us by clearly labeling all items, thank you.
- Please note that unless children are attending breakfast club or Nursery, they should not be on site before 8.40 am at the very earliest.
